Bill & Lois Pattillo's Food Table

After visiting a Gem and Mineral Show in Portland, Oregon and digging thunder eggs at The Richardson Rock Ranch, in October 1982, I decided to fix a table for our March 1983 Corpus Christi Gem and Mineral Show. With my muffins and items from club members, we had a Food Table. Not really a table of food, mainly a lot of dishes with a few rocks.

As we were set up at our March show, San Antonio Club members came and invited us to their show, the next week. Houston saw us in San Antonio, invited us to their show, in September. Jackson, Mississippi saw it in Houston and invited us to their show in February. We were off and running.

At Houston we were offered a loaf of bread. At show's end we went to return



it, thinking it was to be used just that week end. You don't want it? Yes indeed. It fit just right in a bread basket.

In the next few years, invitations to shows grew and so did the table. One year we did twenty-two shows. That's lots of packing dishes, so as not to

break with rocks. Lots of rocks. Many donations from a small piece of candy to a 12 pound round loaf of bread. Now donations make up most of the table. A young girl in Denver, gave us a fried chicken drum stick. We asked if she didn't want to keep it. No it was for us. A little boy donated a piece of fruit. I Asked him if he didn't want to keep it and start his own collection. No, I want you to have this one, then I will start my collection.

In over the last 30 years, the Food Table has grown from a standard 8 foot table, to a false top, to make it 9 feet by 4 feet and then later added the breakfast table.

Because of the rock food table, we were honored with a Certificate of Achievement by the National Rockhound & Lapidary Hall of Fame, Murdo, South Dakota, December 2005.

Rock Food Table articles were in the Rock and Gem Magazine in November, 2000, by Laura Dow, of Austin and August 2009 by Lari Carter, Atlanta, Georgia.

This year at the Corpus Christi Gem and Mineral Society Show, the first weekend of March, the Rock Food Table was thirty years old. That's a long time for an exhibit, that started with a lot of dishes and a few rocks.

SAFETY REPORT

SAFETY NOTE: A COUPLE OF POINT ON DRIVING SAFELY

Hello folks. My inspiration for this month's safety article is from an accident we had at work recently.

While in North Dakota I had received a phone call from a supervisor at one of our ND drilling sites and learned that one of our crew truck drivers had been in a rollover accident. Historically speaking any rollover accident in the oil patch is a BAD thing. Thankfully in this case we do see that there is an occasional miracle. Although the truck flipped it did land upright and my co-worker walked away without a single injury.

With that all being said we still needed to do a preliminary incident investigation. The gentleman involved had just finished a 13-hour shift and had about an hour drive back to camp. First thoughts were along the lines of "asleep at the wheel" or "texting while driving." It was neither.

The cause was **"deviating from the lane of traffic"** which is known amongst accident investigators to be a critical component in compounding the severity of accidents. In this case my

coworker had a flock of birds (ducks or pheasants - he wasn't sure) fly out of the ditch on his right side. His immediate reaction was to swerve and miss the birds. What resulted was the loss of control of the vehicle as the rear of the truck slid into the ditch, hitting a culvert, and resulting in the vehicle rolling. The consequences of "swerving" lead to a totaled vehicle and a potential fatality. Thankfully the later did not occur.

One thing I learned when I got my international driver's license in Japan several years ago is that Americans like to "swerve" in order to try and avoid hazardous situations. The Japanese had some extremely detailed statistics on how Americans driving in Japan, while trying to avoid accidents, actually caused something worse.

The point of the article, and I understand that not everyone will agree with it, is that swerving to avoid hazards in the road can actually increase your risk for a much more serious accident. Better to hit a few birds than flip your vehicle...



My second point for this article is that "seat belts DO work!" My co-worker in ND was properly restrained and walked away from his accident.

One of the saddest statistics I ever read came from some research I did a few years ago for a safety presentation. The NTSB had a statistic that over about a year's time in the mid 2000's that 31,000 children were fatally injured in automobile accidents. Of those 31,000, investigations showed that 16,000 of those children were shown to have not been properly restrained in seat belts or car seats. This is a systemic failure in our society's commitment to protect our children.

Please do not be cavalier with the safety of your children and keep them properly buckled up while on the road.

The Endowment Fund for the SCFMS was created at the Federation meeting in Waco, Texas, in March 1984. It was set up to be funded by voluntary donations of individual members and SCFMS organizations.

At each Federation show there is a silent auction of hobby related items that have been donated by individual members and SCFMS organizations. There has been a silent auction at every SCFMS meeting since 1985.

To help the Endowment Fund, the Patrons were established at the 1985 SCFMS meeting in Wichita Falls, Texas. A Patron is a member who donates \$100.00 or for whom a \$100.00 donation was made to the Endowment Fund. There Patrons are recognized and given a



special patron pin, a patron certificate, and have their name engraved on a bronze plate and placed on the patron plaque which is displayed at each SCFMS show and convention.

In 1986 in order to recognize the donations from the various organizations, the "Patron Clubs" of the SCFMS Endowment Fund was established. All SCFMS organiza-

tions that donate \$100.00 plus \$1.00 per member are recognized as a Patron Club. Additional donations by the organization which equal \$100.00 plus \$1.00 per member bring the organization to a Patron II, III, etc. Each organization is recognized and given a patron certificate and the organization's name is engraved on a bronze plate and placed on the Patron Club plaque, which is displayed at the SCFMS show and convention.

The Endowment Fund is a permanent fund. Only the interest can be used to help support the activities of the Federation.

WORLD'S LARGEST ROSE ROCK CLUSTER

ARDMORE, OKLAHOMA



The world's largest single rose rock cluster known to exist weighs 788 pounds, is 62 inches long, 24 inches high and 18 inches thick. The barite rose rock can be found only in an 80 miles strip which runs north to Guthrie, OK and south to Paul's Valley, OK. The Oklahoma legislature adopted the rose rock as the official State Rock in 1968. This cluster was named "Redwine and Rose" for its founders, Tom and Ann Redwine. It was discovered 20 miles southeast of Norman and required three months to excavate the rock through the use of small brushes to keep the cluster intact. The rose rock cluster required four men two days to extract and four days to remove sand and debris.

A rose rock cluster of this kind and quality are many times more rare than diamonds. Rose rocks grew from slow crystallization of sand and seawater supersaturated with barium sulphate resulting in tabular crystals. The rose rock is composed of numerous tabular crystals intersecting one another around a central axis which appear to rotate on the axis, the result is a rosette. It is this rare formation of tabular crystals that makes the rose rock unique. This took place under the Permian Sea 250 million years ago in what is today Oklahoma. Because barite is harder and more durable than sandstone, the sandstone eroded leaving the rose rock formation on exposed rock surfaces. Further weathering caused them to detach

into individual specimens. Barite is just one type of mineral capable of forming rosettes. Others are hematite, aragonite, chalcedony and selenite. Oklahoma, however, is the only place in the world where barite rose rocks can be found.

This specimen is owned by LOVES. It is displayed at LOVES, 12th Avenue N.W., Ardmore, OK. (North of I-35 at exit 32). This cluster is on view for the public when LOVES is open for business.

(Editor's Note: Information taken from printed pamphlet. Margaret and I were able to see this on display a few years ago. I just wish we had a picture of it.)

Send pictures with the Club name, City and State, and the location of the clean-up and the government body who supervised the event to infolands@amlands.org and we will see they are put up on the website and

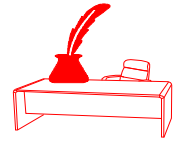
also do a write up in the ALAA Newsletter. I also suggest you send a picture and article to your regional Federation newsletter editor for recognition there too!
