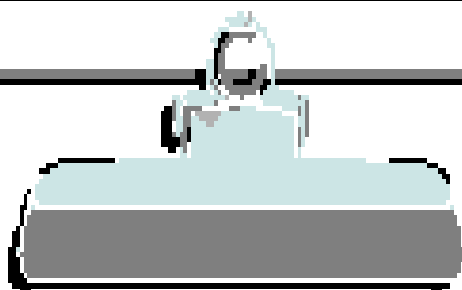

SCFMS NEEDS NOMINEES FOR AFMS SCHOLARSHIP HONOREE FOR 2015

There are seven regional federations within the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies or AFMS. Every year six of those regions, included South Central, receive nominations of individuals who deserve recognition for **contributions they have made in the area of earth science education**. In our federation a committee, consisting of the executive vice-president, the president, and the immediate past president, chooses one of the nominees to be our Honoree for the AFMS Scholarship. As Honoree, he/she in turn selects a university which has graduate studies in earth sciences. A contact professor helps the Honoree find and choose two students to receive \$4000 each in scholarship funds. The two students do not have to be at the same university.

Any club or club member can make a nomination. Background information on the nominee and list of education and contributions to earth science education are needed. Please send your nominees ASAP to interim Executive VP

OK- just to get things going I'm close to my annual "prepare for Hurricanes" article, but figured I'd take this opportunity to get a jump on the issue. Especially since "preppers" seem to be getting vilified by certain government organizations and media outlets these days...

As that old joke goes, "What do a tornado and an Arkansas divorce have in common? Either way someone's losing a mobile home!"

The last few years we've had some really nasty spring storms in the SCFMS areas and it poses the question what to do



Historically folks in our region would build storm cellars, but the nature of modern construction has turned it's nose up on the issue. That was at least until a few years ago when we experienced the disaster of the Tuscaloosa and Joplin tornados. Since then there has been a huge increase in the manufacture of "dig and drop" modular storm shelters. We've installed at least a dozen of these modular shelters at my work sites in the last two years. With purchase of the small shelters averaging less than \$4000 per unit and installation costs being minimal it was truly a "no brainer." Our shelters in the Fort Worth and Shreveport areas were used 5 times last year! The shelters worked great.

So I'm not saying that these modular shelters are for everyone, but if you can afford one and think you need one they are a great and overall inexpensive way to keep yourself and your loved ones safe.

ATTENTION STUDENTS YOUR LESSON FOR THIS MONTH IS LEARNING ABOUT MINERALS 101

APATITE may be transparent, translucent, or opaque, with a color that varies from white to brown, green, yellow or violet. Hexagonal crystals are common. Apatite is a phosphate of calcium, usually with some fluorine ($\text{Ca}_3(\text{Cl},\text{F})-(\text{PO}_4)_3$). Hardness 5; Specific Gravity 3.2; luster, glassy; streak, white.

ARAGONITE is chemically the same as calcite (CaCO_3) but is less common and crystallizes in the orthorhombic system. It is slightly harder and heavier: Hardness 3.5 to 4; Specific Gravity 2.9. Aragonite is usually white, gray or cream.

AMETHYST is in the crystalline quartz family. It's color may vary, due to traces of manganese. Deeper colored specimens are cut as gems. Amethyst has a hardness of seven and density of 2.65. It's luster is non-metallic. Amethyst is in the crystalline quartz family.

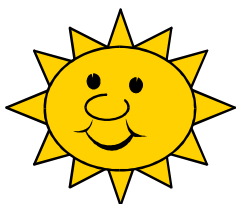
CELESTITE (SrSO_4) Strontium Sulfate, has the same structure as Barite (BaSO_4), and forms very similar crystals. Celestite is a favorite among mineral collectors. Its sky blue (or celestial) color is very pretty, and is unique in the mineral kingdom.

KEITH HARMON IS AFMS SCHOLARSHIP HONOREE FOR 2014

With great pleasure we announce that Keith Harmon has been selected as our SCFMS Scholarship Honoree for 2014. Keith, in his usual humble spirit, does not see himself as a great earth science educator, but all who have served with him in clubs, in our federation, and worked with him at gem shows know how much he has given of himself to share his knowledge and love of minerals, rocks, and fossils.

Keith graduated from Corsicana High School in 1967, and Stephen F. Austin State University in 1971. He has chosen Stephen F. Austin University to select his student scholarship recipients. He married Charlotte in 1970. She lost her battle with cancer in 2013 and, at Keith's request, we enthusiastically honored her memory with over \$2500 in contributions to the AFMS Scholarship Fund.

Keith joined United States Marine Corps Reserve 1970-1982. He worked as a Teacher 1975-1979, in the oilfield 1980-1988, owner of an insurance agency 1986-2014, and gem and mineral dealer 1992-2014. On April 6, 2014 Keith married Toni L. Harrison in Texas City.

Drawn to rockhounding initially through interest in pretty minerals, Keith's interest expanded to all fields as he was exposed to various elements of the hobby. He has had club membership in East Texas Gem & Mineral Society, Rollin' Rock Club, Pine Country Gem & Mineral Society, and Chaparral Rockhounds.

In the East Texas Gem & Mineral Society he served as president, treasurer, show committee/chairman. He served SCFMS as treasurer, executive vice-president, president, ad hoc insurance committee and currently serves Rollin' Rock Club as president.

Over the years as a club member, Keith has made presentations to public and private schools, programs for Discovery Science Place workshops, started gem and mineral show with Don Campbell and Charles Creekmur for East Texas Gem & Mineral Society, and put together the liability insurance program for SCFMS under the leadership of then SCFMS president, George Browne. He was awarded the SCFMS Gold Spark Plug Award in 2013, which is the highest award presented by SCFMS.

There is no other person in SCFMS who has done more than Keith to increase contributions to the AFMS Scholarship Fund, an endowment whose interest provides \$48,000 in scholarships to six regional federations annually. Twice the endowment was not able to fund the scholarships as needed. Keith was instrumental in making up the deficit both times by challenging clubs in all regional federations to donate "undesignated" funds, thus meeting this need. Along with Diane Weir of the Roswell Chaparral Rockhounds, Keith developed the Rollin' Rock Club Treasure Chest fundraising method for the AFMS Scholarship Fund. Since our last SCFMS annual meeting in August, 2013, the Rollin' Rock Club has already donated \$1843 to the scholarship endowment. Most of those funds were from the auction of this year's Treasure Chest which will be awarded in Baton Rouge by a drawing of names of winning bidders at Rollin' Rock meetings.

Many of you will see Keith at your annual shows. I encourage you to give him both congratulations and thanks for all his work

AMERICAN FEDERATION "Code of Ethics"

- I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without permission from the owner.
 - I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.
 - I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.
 - I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.
 - I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.
 - I will leave all gates as found.
 - I will build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.
 - I will discard no burning material - matches, cigarettes, etc.
 - I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.
 - I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.
 - I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.
 - I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.
 - I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.
 - I will cooperate with field-trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.
 - I will report to my club or federation officers, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.
 - I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.
 - I will observe the "Golden Rule", will use Good Outdoor Manners and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and Public Image of Rockhounds everywhere.

AFMS LAND USE POLICY

1. Adherence to the AFMS Code of Ethics assures compliance with most statutes and regulations governing collecting on public lands and encourages respect for private property rights and the environment. Clubs are urged to read the AFMS Code of Ethics in at least one meeting every year, to publish the Code frequently in the club newsletter, and to compel compliance on club field trips.
2. Individuals and clubs are urged to write their elected representatives and land use management agency supervisors regarding issues of rule making, legislation and enforcement effecting field collecting of minerals and fossils.
3. Individuals and clubs are urged to join and support activities of the American lands Access Association (ALAA), a sister organization with responsibility for advancing the interests of earth science amateurs with legislatures and land use management agencies.
4. The AFMS will receive a report from ALAA at its annual meeting.
5. The AFMS endorses the principle of multiple use of public lands as a guarantee of continuing recreational opportunities.
6. Wilderness and monument designations are inconsistent with the principle of multiple use. In view of the vast amount of public land already designated as wilderness and monuments, future such designations should be minimal, taking into account the increased demand for recreational opportunities, including rockhounding, created by a growing population.
7. In furtherance of the principle of multiple use, the AFMS believes that laws, regulations and rules established by relevant governmental authorities should be designed to allow freest possible access to all public lands, coupled with minimal restrictions on the recreational collection of minerals, fossils, gemstone materials and other naturally occurring materials.
8. A right to collect minerals and fossils on public lands should be protected by statute.
9. The AFMS urges its members to work with any or all government authorities to achieve a good working relationship in order to improve the "Public Image" at recreational collectors.

FLUORESCENT VIEW BOX ON A BUDGET

As rockhounds we love rocks and minerals in all shapes, sizes and colors. But what we see with our naked eyes is very limited. That is when we enter the realm of fluorescence. With the aid of UV lights we are able to see what nature has hidden from us in plain sight. I have had a UV light for many years but never a “view box”. Like most rockhounds I know, I felt the cost didn’t seem to justify purchasing one. Last summer, I was asked to “talk about rocks” at various library summer reading programs in several counties. In the past, when speaking with children, my programs varied i.e. moh’s scale, the formation of rock. This age group ranged from ages 4 – 16, depending on the particular library. My goal was to make one general lesson plan and adjust it according to the age group. I realized that the one thing that fascinated children of all ages (adults too) was fluorescent minerals. So began my journey into creating an inexpensive, lightweight view box. After much thought, I opted to use a cardboard box. I constructed this box to fit my Raytech R5 UV Light. I know that many of you craftsman can create the same via woodworking but I didn’t dare ask my husband to get involved in another project as I seem to do that frequently – LOL!!! So this is my version of a view box. Well, it works for me..

MATERIALS USED:

Sturdy cardboard box (I used a 14”x14”x14” box from Wal-Mart)
2 poster boards (black foam board)
Box cutter / Exacto knife

Tape measure
Glue gun and hot glue
½ yd Black fabric (opaque)
1 can black spray paint

Instructions:

1. Spray the exterior of the box with the paint.
2. Cut off one side of the box. This will be the side opening where you will slip the minerals into the box.
3. Cut an opening at the top of the box, sized to match the size of the UV **light lens**.
4. Cut a viewing slot on the front of your box. Leave the upper side of the slot uncut. This allows you to bend the cut portion inward which provides protection from directly viewing the UV light. The cut looks like this



1. The length of the horizontal cut is about 4 inches and the two horizontal cuts are about 2”.
2. Using your box cutter, cut the black foam board to fit all sides of the interior of the box. Make certain to measure each section because dimensions do change as you add each side. On the section that sets in at the top of the box you will have to measure and cut out the opening for the lens. You will be doing the same thing for the “viewing slot”.
3. Glue the foam board sections to the inside of the box. (before gluing, make certain that it fits snugly).
4. Cut two pieces of fabric about 9”x 13”. Attach the black fabric on the open side of the box with your glue gun. The key is to block all visible light so make certain that the fabric extends about 1” inch on each side and bring it around. There will be about a 1” overlap in the center.
5. To secure the UV light sitting on the top of the box, cut 4 sections of foam board and hot glue at the opening leaving about ½” so your light can easily fit. The height of the board will be about 2”. The length will depend on your UV light.

Additional materials you will want to have on hand will be risers and the left over black fabric as well as safety glasses. Since our fluorescent minerals are in all shapes and sizes, the risers allow some flexibility to allow you to bring smaller specimens up closer to the light. I use storage containers for risers and then cover with the black fabric.
